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From the Principal

I would like to firstly begin by acknowledging and thanking the Wisdom College community for their warm welcome given to myself throughout the 2022 school year.

Whilst I did commence employment at Wisdom in 2021, this year has seen my first full year in the role, and has given me the opportunity to experience the full cycle of all four Terms, and all the various events, highlights and challenges that come with that. This is significant as I am cognisant that I was the first non-Muslim Principal of Wisdom College so I am sure that this may have brought with it some trepidation and anxiety. So I would like to also thank the QECF Board for their courage and foresight, as well as their support, in my appointment to lead the College. I hope that I have provided the care and leadership to the staff, students and community of Wisdom College that is required of such a diverse community of people, who are all striving to improve their lives and to provide a strong environment in which to work and learn.

Diversity is one word that does come to mind at Wisdom College. With over 40 different nationalities, cultural and ethnic backgrounds across our student body, diversity is certainly a way to describe our College. It is also a key platform of the core philosophy of our College, this being Hizmet. We are proud to be a Hizmet school, and the values that this represents, this being service, tolerance, kindness, and acceptance to list but a few.

Hizmet is also the Turkish word for service, and that is certainly something that we have tried to implement throughout this school year. We have established a service learning program and given students the opportunity to engage with a range of activities to assist those less fortunate. It is something that we feel strongly about as it instills within our students a sense of care, gratitude, and empathy, as well as simply helping those in need.

We have implemented a number of initiatives this year. Its important to acknowledge these as they have had a positive impact on how we care for and educate our students. This year alone we have implemented a tuckshop, sporting carnivals for swimming and cross country to add to our athletics carnival, a College App to assist with communication and information sharing, Formals and Semi-Formals for our Year 11 and 12 students, additional outdoor education camps across most Years, a new website, a new online enrolment platform, and



provided new laptops and lockers to our secondary students. We have implemented a new school management system called TASS, and a new Learning Management System called Schoolbox. We've built a raft of new facilities including new classrooms, seating, shade and walkways, we've built an additional basketball court, upgraded our playgrounds and library and done plenty of landscaping. We have also developed a number of curriculum related programs including a Literacy program, a greater appreciation of the importance of academic data to inform practice, a Teaching and Learning Framework to provide us that overarching vision for how we teach and how we learn, and a Wellbeing Framework to guide us on how we care for all sectors of our community. These are significant projects and cannot happen without the buy-in from our staff, many of whom have led the creation of these initiatives.

Our staff have been amazing this year. We have hosted a number of events including parent and Parliamentary Iftar dinners, the College Fete, Science week, Book week, parent morning teas, parent-teacher interviews, subject selection information sessions, and end of year performances. Our staff have also engaged in a host of professional learning so that they can continue to grow professionally such as youth mental health first aid, pastoral care, vocational career pathways, IT, ESL, learning difficulties, the neuroscience of learning and instructional planning to name but a few. I would like to thank all of our wonderful staff and this includes teachers, school officers, teacher aides and the senior leadership team of the College.

This year also saw our first graduating class of Year 12 students. Many of these students started with us as Primary students, so to see them finish their formal years of school is a major milestone both for them personally and for our College history.

We have had a very full year with learning a new curriculum, new games, new routines, creating new friendships and everything in between-it's no wonder the year has completely flown by!





In Year 8 art, the students learned how to create portraits that represented who they were. They also used what they learned about mixed media to create a resolved work that depicted an endangered Australian animal.

For Drama, both Years performed a script from a play to an audience of their peers. To do this, they had to memorise their lines, choose a costume, and ensure that they worked as a group to make their performance as polished as possible. The Year 7's then went on to design a whole class play entitled 'Modsiw College' where teachers became students, and students became teachers in an upside-down version of 'Wisdom College'. To do this, they had to act in role as a scriptwriter, director, and an actor. I was very impressed at the skills exhibited by the Year 7 students. They are natural dramatists! The Year 8's completed a unit of design and technology wherein they had to design and then create their very own toy for a child aged 3-5. They were very excited about this project and made some creative new toys. In Year 9, the students learned how to use a variety of media to create a resolved body of work. They created an experimental portfolio by sketching and painting still-life objects; both natural and man-made. They also completed a 'Street Art' unit, wherein they chose an issue that they were passionate about and used spray paint to create a resolved work that depicted their thoughts on the issue. It was awesome seeing how creative and capable the Year 9 students are! I'm looking forward to seeing them develop even more in their creative endeavours.

Year 11 & 12 students covered several topics in art this year. Firstly, they engaged with stage design concepts; thinking deeply about how they could create artwork that could contribute to a staged production. They then explored radical and revolutionary art; particularly how historical artists challenged the 'status quo' resulting in artworks that were





radically different from the norm. Lastly, they explored ideas of the 'alternate' in terms of how different concepts and making practices can challenge them to think differently about their own creative processes. This resulted in them creating resolved works that reflected diverse perspectives on a chosen issue.

The students at Wisdom College demonstrate so much potential in the creative subjects. It has been a privilege for me to watch as they grow and develop in their passions and talents. I have no doubt that we have some up-and-coming artists from our school who will continue to create and inspire others for their entire lives. I'm very excited to see what next year will bring.

Health and Physical Education

After several weeks of anticipation, the brand-new multipurpose court was complete and ready for use in the early stages of 2022. Although primarily designed as a Secondary School lunchtime space, all 3-12 Physical Education classes were able to use the court throughout the year. Year 3 to 6 Physical Education classes especially enjoyed using the facility as a dodgeball arena in Term 2, while it was also of significant benefit for Secondary School badminton and volleyball units.

The new sports facility led a year of firsts for HPE at Wisdom. In the lead up to Wisdom's inaugural Inter-house Swimming Carnival, Year 7 and 8 students were able to practice and refine their swimming strokes at the Parkinson Aquatic Centre. Over the Term it was amazing to see the growth in confidence of many students in the pool, especially those with limited previous experience. In another college first, students in Year 10 were introduced to Orienteering to complement a Safety and First Aid unit. This was a challenging unit which brought students out of their comfort zone as they learned to read a map, use a compass, and other orienteering skills to navigate their way safely through parks, suburban areas and even forests. Highlights for Year 9 HPE included an AFL season using the Sport Education Model. All students were drafted across one of six teams and entrusted with individual roles and responsibilities. The season provided opportunities to develop autonomy and an array of skills including leadership, coaching, team organisation and cooperation.

Near the end of 2022, Sport and Recreation kicked off as a new applied subject for senior students. The new subject has an emphasis on healthy living, communities, personal and interpersonal skills, and incorporates learning in, through and about sport and recreation activities. In Term 4 the students completed a Sports Nutrition Module, in through and about Beach Volleyball which incorporated an assessment task requiring students to create a nutritional plan for a three-day Beach Volleyball competition. Students enjoyed playing at the Sandstorm Beach Volleyball Complex and using their nutritional plans to aid performance.

Mr James Easthope also joined Wisdom in Term 4 as the new Head of Secondary and brings a wealth of HPE experience to the Secondary School.
